



The History of Hollywood and Movies

Comprehension Questions:

Lesson Plan: The History of Hollywood and Movies

Warm-up activity (5 minutes):

Start the class by asking the students if they enjoy watching movies and what their favorite movies are. Write some of their responses on the board.

Introduction (10 minutes):

Wrap-up activity (5 minutes):

Bring the class back together and ask some of the groups to share their answers to the discussion points. Recap the main points of the lesson, and ask the students if they learned anything new about the history of Hollywood and movies.

Homework (optional):

As an optional homework assignment, ask the students to watch a Hollywood movie and write a short review or summary of it, highlighting their favorite parts and why they enjoyed it.
